REMINDER

- Monterey County schools are required to comply with California Education Code Sections 32280 and 35294, dealing with the preparation of “safe school plans”, as well as requirements that schools be adequately prepared to respond to earthquakes, fires, and other emergencies (California Education Code § 35295 through § 35297 and California Government Code § 8607)

- Each school is required to adopt its comprehensive school safety plan by March 1st of each calendar year. Before adopting its comprehensive school safety plan, the school site council or school safety planning committee must hold a public meeting at the school site in order to allow members of the public the opportunity to express an opinion about the school safety plan.
