School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2009-10)

The Monterey County Home Charter School is a dependent charter with the Monterey County Office of Education. MCHCS serves students whose families are willing and able to provide instruction at home in Kindergarten through Grade 12 in Monterey County and adjacent counties. Credentialed teachers meet with families bi-weekly and monitor students' progress in curricular areas as outlined by the California State Standards.

"The mission of the Monterey County Home Charter School is to plan, monitor and assist in the education of students in K – 12 in a homeschool learning environment enabling them to speak, read, write, use technology and calculate effectively to become self-motivated, competent, and life-long learners. The Monterey County Home Charter School will provide students with the necessary resources to achieve success and meet state standards in core academic subjects appropriate to their level. This will be achieved in a collaborative effort with parents as primary deliverers of the educational program, certificated teachers and the community."

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2009-10)

Parents meet with their assigned credentialed resource teacher for bi-weekly meetings. Parents in this program are completely involved as the daily and primary instructors of their children. Monthly workshops, field trips, and programs enable parents to share with their students. Also workshops that address parent needs are held monthly. IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA). The assessments under the STAR program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven. The CAPA includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations. The CMA is an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through nine, mathematics for grades three through seven and Algebra I and science in grades five, eight, and ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels. XI. School Completion and Postsecondary Preparation

Admission Requirements for California Public Universities

University of California

Admission requirements for the University of California (UC) follow guidelines set forth in the Master Plan, which requires that the top one-eighth of the state's high school graduates, as well as those transfer students who have successfully completed specified college work, be eligible for admission to the UC. These requirements are designed to ensure that all eligible students are adequately prepared for University-level work. California State University

Admission requirements for the California State University (CSU) use three factors to determine eligibility. They are specific high school courses; grades in specified courses and test scores; and graduation from high school. Some campuses have higher standards for particular majors or students who live outside the local campus area. Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses utilize local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region. XII. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

Professional Development

This section provides information on the annual number of school days dedicated to staff development for the most recent three-year period.

The Monterey County Home Charter School has been undergoing an extensive three-year VPSS (Verification Process for Special Settings) plan to ensure that all teachers are highly qualified in the core curricular areas of Mathematics, Science, Social Science, and English/Language Arts. Teachers have completed 40 - 80 hours of instruction in all areas except English. Those teachers who need certification in English will undergo coursework this summer.

Additionally one staff meeting per month is dedicated to staff development. Staff development subject matter is chosen based on the school's needs. These topics emphasize areas such as teaching strategies for the standards-based curriculum to student exam preparedness.
